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West VP Report:

I was fortunate this year to be able to attend the 2011 Southern California Scale Qualifier at Hemet on April 9th & 10th. Curtis Kitteringham & the Hemet Model Masters did an excellent job promoting their qualifier and were rewarded with 34 entries in five classes. This was the largest turnout in recent year's memory and the Hemet Model Masters had their field in top-notch shape for the event with a new smooth runway paving job and a new huge metal shade ramada in the pits. The facilities were excellent for a scale qualifier and the contest workers were all friendly, helpful, and happy to have their event supported so well. The 'boys from Arizona' brought ten entries to the contest, most of which were members of the mighty One Eighth Air Force. It was a great event, and if you haven't been to it before, mark your calendars for next year – you won't regret the experience.

The Scale Masters nominating committee has completed its work for 2011 and has developed a slate of candidates for the positions of National Chairman, East Coast Vice-Chairman, West Coast Vice-Chairman, Director of Administration, and Director of Finance. The USSMA will formally announce those individuals nominated for these jobs on or about June 10th. This year there are two candidates running for National Chairman (Carolyn Van Herk and Bernie Boland) and two candidates running for West Coast Vice-Chairman (Phil Goodwine and Curtis Kitteringham). These candidates offer a choice in how your organization will be run for the next three years, and I encourage all of you to communicate with them to find out what they would like to accomplish for the Scale Masters organization. The other candidates running singly for elected positions are Mike Barbee for East Coast Vice-Chairman, Mitch Baker for Director of Administration, and Richard Barndt for Director of Finance. Balloting will begin on August 9th and will close on August 23rd, 2011. Voting is a privilege limited to current members of the US Scale Masters, so remember to become informed and above all, vote.

Planning for the Championships event is coming along nicely and it will be a top-notch event to determine the best of the best again this year. Both Gunsmoke and Hemet had excellent turnouts and qualified a good number of excellent pilots for the Championships, so attendance should be well up for Fresno. Several qualifiers are yet to be held, so if you haven't yet qualified, plan to go, compete, and 'git er done'.

I think we all recognize the importance of bringing new people into scale r/c modeling (at any level) for the collective well-being and continuation of our sport. I would like to cite a couple of examples of what is being done out West, but would like to hear from those who have also tried some things to stir

interest in r/c modelers who might benefit from a nudge toward scale. Sharing such information and experiences may just get some other people interested in doing something... anything to encourage new folks in getting into scale competition.

Mike Greenshields is the new Scale Squadron of Southern California's Commander and has convinced the group to add a scale competition primer component to their hugely popular Chino annual scale fly-in. My understanding is that during the regular non-competitive fly-in, they are making one flight line available to anyone who wants to learn more about how to fly in a scale competition. That flight line will be manned by experienced scale modelers who will share their advice and information about maneuver selection, how maneuvers are judged and scored, mandatory and elective maneuvers, etc., with the hope of getting new people interested in flying in a competition environment. This is a great idea when done in conjunction with an established scale fly-in as the people who are there are already interested in scale airplanes.

The One Eighth Air Force recently completed a 10 week seminar, hosted and funded by one of their members, Rich Wildey, where a new P-47 ARF kit was bashed to teach people techniques in scale finishing & detailing. Three or four members were recruited to be 'instructors' for different phases of the seminar and to lead the hands-on training of modelers who had never tried to modify an ARF with scale improvements. Much of the work done over the 10 consecutive Saturday afternoons included removal of stock iron-on covering, surface prep, fiberglass covering, panel-line and rivet detailing, spray painting, fitting of scale oleo struts & wheels, finishing and installation of a dummy motor, scale cowl attachment, modification and scale attachment of flight surfaces & trim tabs, and so forth, in addition to more routine ARF assembly work. The seminar was quite successful and a future seminar of a built-up kit is now being considered.

Some clubs and individuals have hosted scale boot-camps in the past where a day, or a weekend at a field, is dedicated to discussing and teaching the finer points of documentation and competitive flying of scale models. Curtis Kitteringham, Roly Worsfold, and others have both organized those kinds of events in the past. Perhaps this is the year that you or your club can get more involved in promoting scale modeling and flying. If you have done, or are planning this or a different type of a teaching activity for the future, give me a call and I'll help with some publicity or recognition.

The One Eight Air Force helps fund this so lets take advantage of it to help generate some interest with the youth. CD's please check the web site and make sure you submit your qualifier information. This is the only way we can let Airtronics know to contact to about the radio they donate as a prize to each qualifier, and how we update the calendars. When your qualifier is complete, please submit the information via the form on the web site. Again, this sends the information to the proper people so we can get notifications to those who have qualified. Leading into that, e-mail notifications for qualified pilots will

be going out shortly for those we have e-mail addresses. Now a reminder to the members, if you are competing, make sure you let the CD know you are a USSMA member. We have ask all CD's of qualifiers to give the members a \$5.00 discount on your entry fee. If the CD forgets, remind them. The club hosting does not loose anything by doing this, USSMA reimburses the club. I am very busy this time of year, not only trying to get all the updates from CD's posted figuring out who is qualified, but work is really busy this time of year. If you e-mail me and don't get a response right away, please be patient. If you don't hear anything in a couple days, try again...
